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
Purim 3 Part Cards

These 3 part story cards are a wonderful way to engage your child in Jewish learning, as well as introducing and practicing vocabulary, matching, reading and learning about Jewish concepts.

These 3 part story cards are designed to be used with a parent or teacher who helps the child initially. After the child learns the sequence of the story, they can review and practice themselves by matching the object and summary cards to the control card.

These 3-part story cards can be used with children who are reading and those who are not reading yet. Non-verbal children can also use these cards and show their understanding by pointing.

Once printed, cut out the cards. Note that for each card "set," there will be a control card on the left side (picture + text below), object card on the right (just the picture), and label or summary card on the right below the object card (text). You can use the cards immediately or laminate them.



When you are ready to start, place each control card down one at a time, from left to right, reading the card as you set it out. Placing the cards left to right helps with early reading skills as that is the direction we read in.

You can ask your child questions about the cards to check comprehension and memory.

- **Next, you can ask your child to match the picture card with the image on the corresponding control card.**

Then, if your child is reading, you can ask your child to match the label or summary card with the control card.

You could also use these cards in a memory game. Flip the cards with images face down and choose two at a time trying to match the images on the cards. You could also print two copies of the PDF and match the cards exactly.

Purim is a joyful holiday commemorating the Jews being saved in ancient Persia.



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Purim is celebrated on the 14th of Adar. In leap years it is celebrated during Adar II.



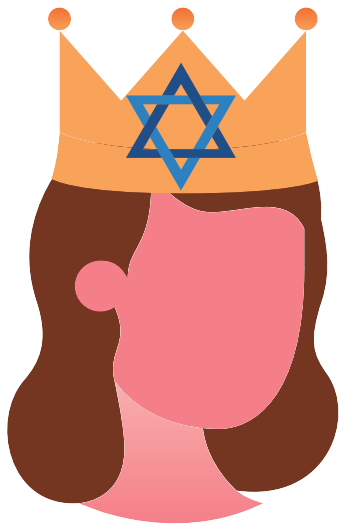
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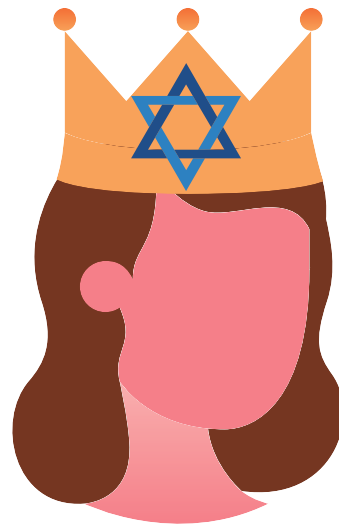
The Purim story takes place in Shushan, Persia. The evil prime minister, Haman, hates the Jews. He convinces King Ahasuerus the Jews must be killed.



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Haman casts lots to see which day would be the best one for his evil plan. The Jews are saved by Queen Esther, who reveals she is Jewish to her husband, the king.



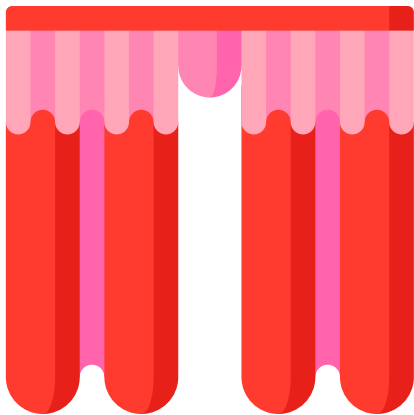
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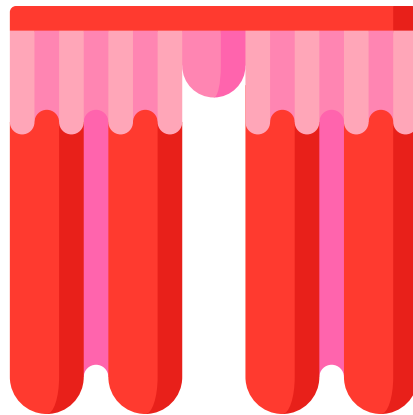
Purim is often celebrated by watching a Purim spiel, shaking groggers, eating hamantaschen, dressing up in costumes, and performing the four mitzvot of Purim.



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A Purim spiel is a funny play that tells the story of Purim.



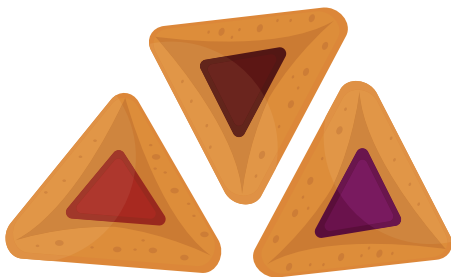
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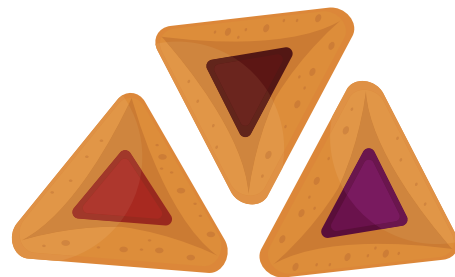
A grogger is a noisemaker used to drown out Haman's name. Every time you hear his name you boo and make noise.



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Hamantaschen are triangle shaped cookies that are supposed to remind us of Haman's hat.



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The four mitzvot of Purim are to listen to the Megillah, give matanot l'evyonim (gifts of charity to the poor), give mishloach manot (Purim baskets), and have a Seudat Purim, a festive Purim meal.



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Many Jewish communities also have a carnival where people dress up in costume.



HOW TO USE

These nomenclature cards are designed to be used with a parent or teacher who helps the child initially. After the child learns the name of each picture, they can review and practice themselves by matching the object and summary cards to the control card.

These nomenclature cards can be used with children who are reading and those who are not reading yet. Non-verbal children can also use these cards and show their understanding by pointing.

Once printed, cut out the cards. PURIM STORY SEQUENCING

INTRODUCTION

Thank you for your purchase! This Purim Story Sequence is a wonderful way to engage your child in Jewish learning, as well as practice their memory, concentration, reading, and sequencing skills!

HOW TO USE

Print out the cards and summary sheet. Cut out the cards along the solid line as well as between the image card and the sequence summary card below it (where the scissor icon is).

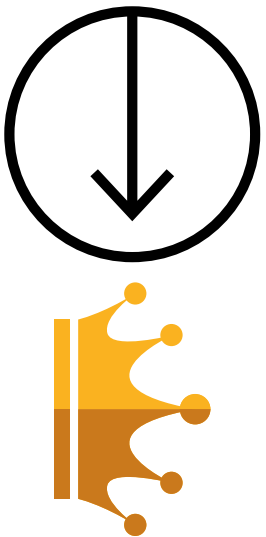
Glue or tape the sequence summaries cards to the back of their respective image card.

If desired, laminate.

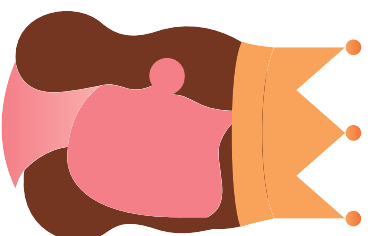
You can also add Velcro stickies if you want to tell the story on a felt board.

To practice the sequencing, you can start with the first card and read the summary, then show the image. Read the remaining cards in order, lining them up as you read them. You can also put all cards in a pile or basket and invite your child to look through the cards to find the first one, and so on, helping them practice telling the story and sequencing themselves.

The story is also provided in this packet after the sequence card pages.



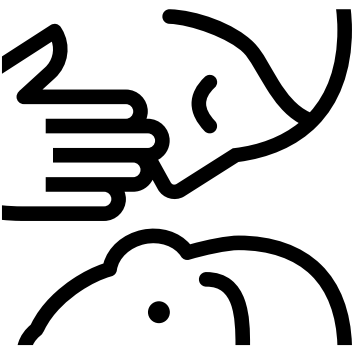
1. King Ahashverosh gave a party and ordered his first wife, Queen Vashiti, to appear before his guests. When she refused, he banished her from the kingdom.

4. Esther's uncle Mordecai overheard two guards plotting to kill King Ahashverosh and told the King.

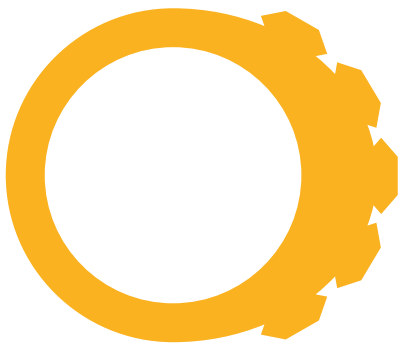


5. King Ahashverosh's prime minister, Haman, demanded that everyone should bow down to him as a sign of respect. Mordecai refused. This made Haman mad.

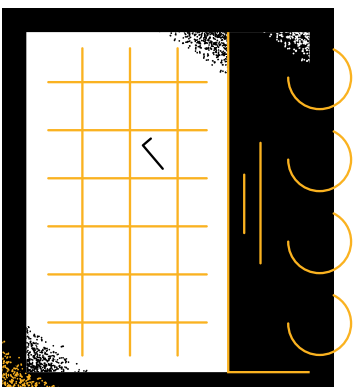


6. King Ahashverosh honored Mordecai for saving his life using the ideas that Haman thought would be for himself.





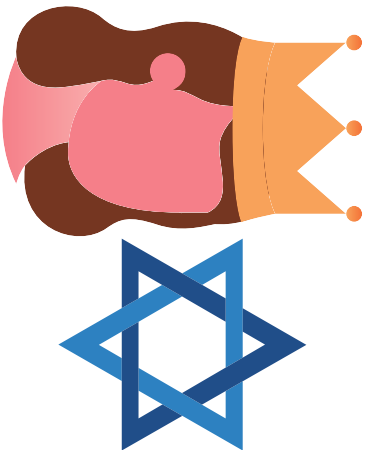
7. Haman hated not only Mordecai, but all the Jews for being different. He asked the King for his ring to give him authority to punish the Jews.



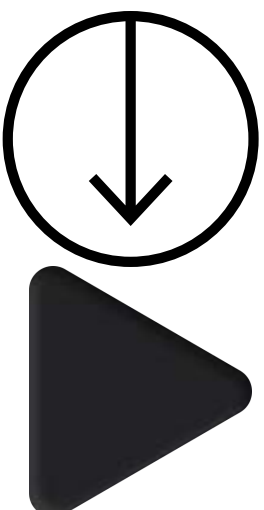
8. Haman picked lots and decided that on the 13th day of Adar he would get rid of all the Jews.

11. King Ahasverosh did not want his wife, Queen Esther, hurt so he got rid of Haman.



12. On the 14th of Adar the Jews were saved from destruction. It was a joyous day for the Jewish people so we now celebrate in joyous ways for the holiday of Purim.

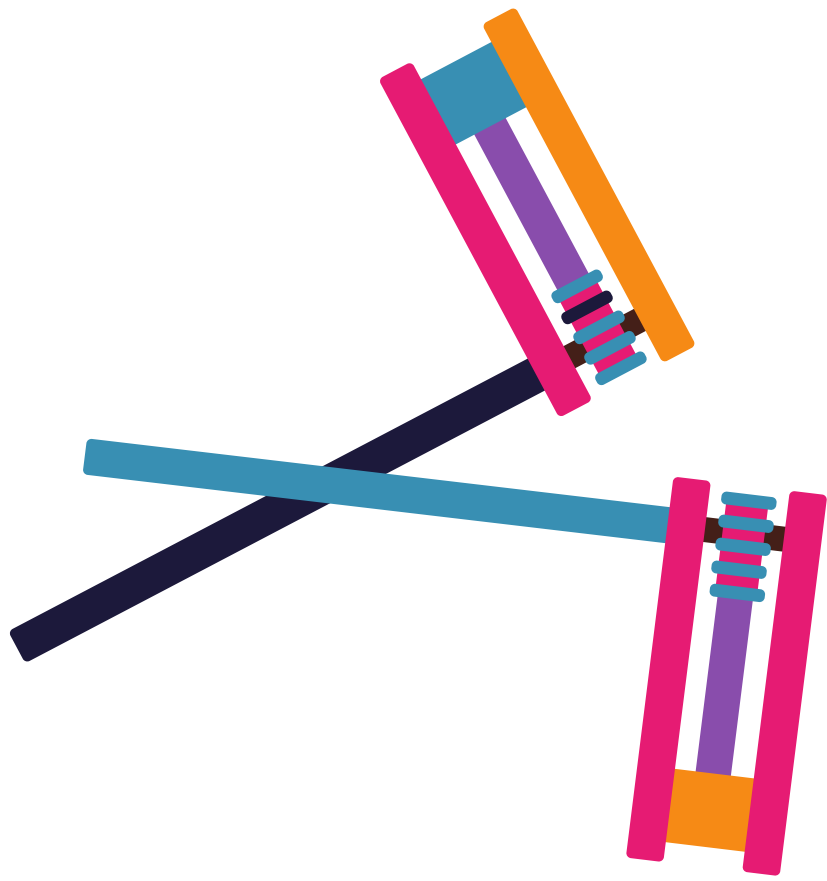
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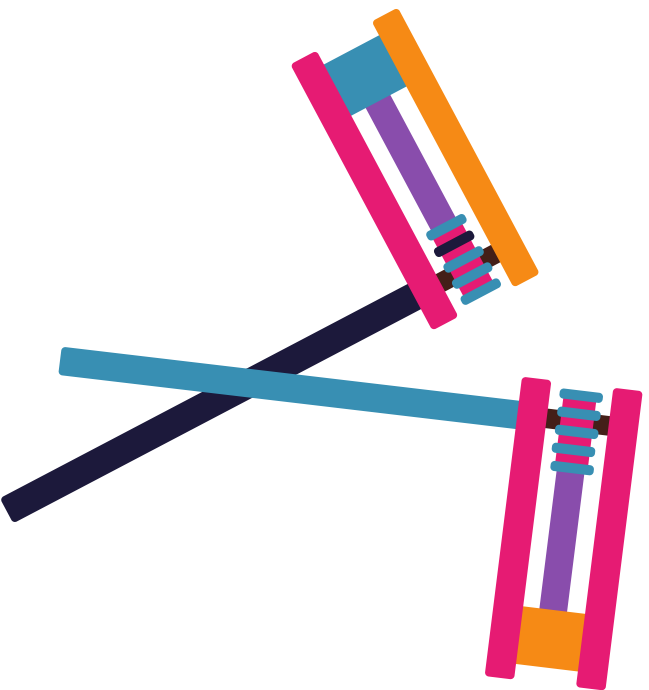
Purim Popsicle Stick Puzzles

These Purim Popsicle Stick Puzzles are a simple DIY for your kiddos. Print out the Popsicle Stick Puzzle pages. Glue popsicle sticks to the back of each image. Trim around the perimeters so you have separate puzzles. Use an exacto knife to carefully slice between each popsicle stick. You will be left with multiple puzzle sticks. You can number the bottom of the popsicle sticks to make it easier for your child to put together the puzzle.

After each puzzle page is a prompt page. You can print and cut out the prompts, placing them next to the sticks to help guide your child, if needed.

* **Memory game:** Print two copies. Turn all cards over then take turns turning them right side up and try to match the Tu B'Shevat images

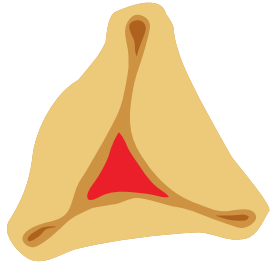
