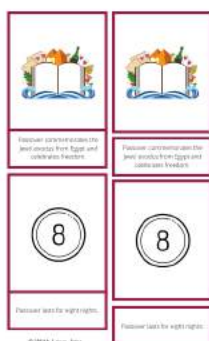

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Passover 3 Part Cards

These 3 part story cards are a wonderful way to engage your child in Jewish learning, as well as introducing and practicing vocabulary, matching, reading and learning about Jewish concepts.

These 3 part story cards are designed to be used with a parent or teacher who helps the child initially. After the child learns the sequence of the story, they can review and practice themselves by matching the object and summary cards to the control card.

These 3-part story cards can be used with children who are reading and those who are not reading yet. Non-verbal children can also use these cards and show their understanding by pointing.

Once printed, cut out the cards. Note that for each card "set," there will be a control card on the left side (picture + text below), object card on the right (just the picture), and label or summary card on the right below the object card (text). You can use the cards immediately or laminate them.



When you are ready to start, place each control card down one at a time, from left to right, reading the card as you set it out. Placing the cards left to right helps with early reading skills as that is the direction we read in.

You can ask your child questions about the cards to check comprehension and memory.

Next, you can ask your child to match the picture card with the image on the corresponding control card.

Then, if your child is reading, you can ask your child to match the label or summary card with the control card.

You could also use these cards in a memory game. Flip the cards with images face down and choose two at a time trying to match the images on the cards. You could also print two copies of the PDF and match the cards exactly.

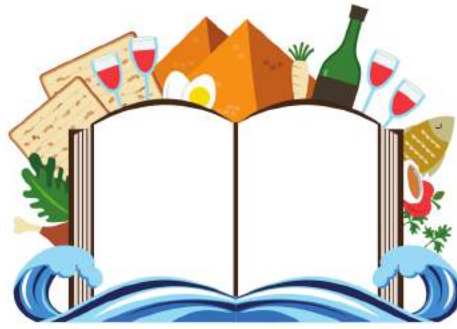

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The main Passover ritual is a seder. It usually occurs on the first and/or second night.



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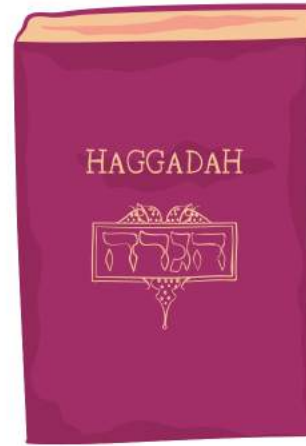
The Passover Seder is a festive meal that involves the retelling of the Passover story, drinking four cups of wine, and eating ritual foods.



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During the Seder you use a Haggadah which is a guide for the seder.



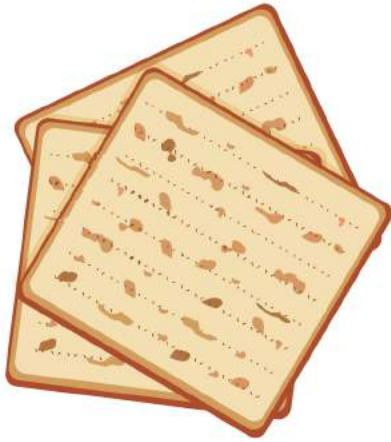
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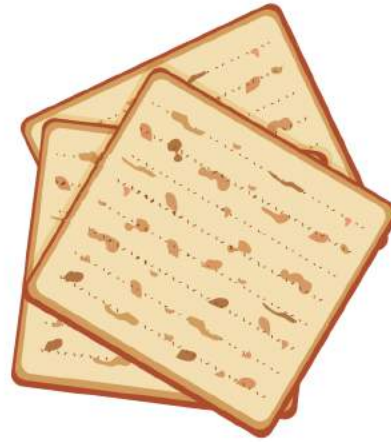
During Passover there are many dietary restrictions. This is known as keeping kosher for Passover. You cannot eat chametz, any leavened grain. This includes wheat, oats, rye, barley or spelt.



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Matzah is eaten during Passover. Matzah is unleavened bread that symbolizes the haste in which the Jews fled Egypt.



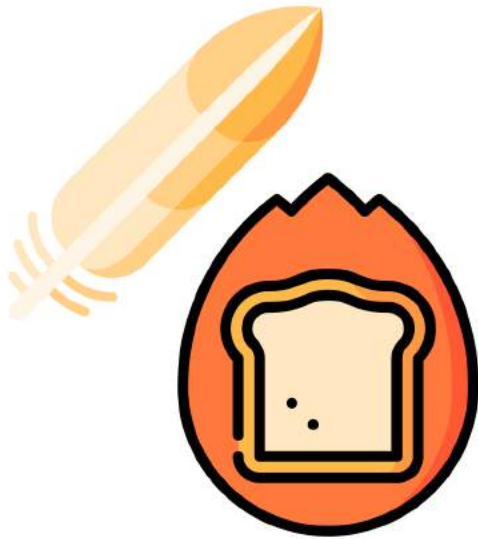

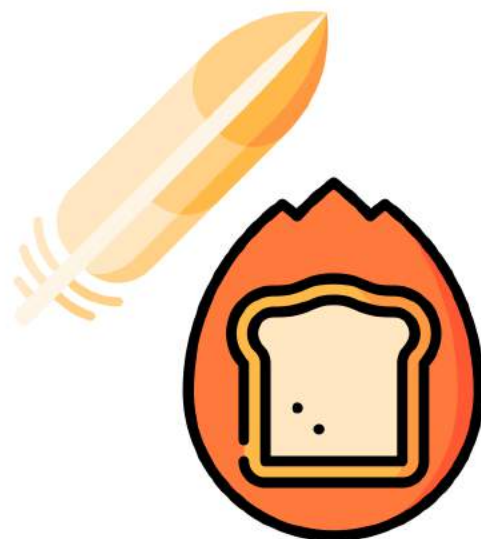

INTRODUCTION


These nomenclature cards are a wonderful way to engage your child in Jewish learning, as well as introducing and practicing vocabulary, matching, reading and learning about Jewish concepts.

HOW TO USE

These nomenclature cards are designed to be used with a parent or teacher who helps the child initially. After the child learns the name of each picture, they can review and practice themselves by matching the object and summary cards to the control card.

These nomenclature cards can be used with children who are reading and those who are not reading yet. Non-verbal children can also use these cards and show their understanding by pointing.

Once printed, cut out the cards. Note that for each card "set," there will be a control card on the left side (picture + text below), object card on the right (just the picture), and label or summary card on the right below the object card (text). You can use the cards immediately or laminate them.



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Then, if your child is reading, you can ask your child to match the label or summary card with the control card.

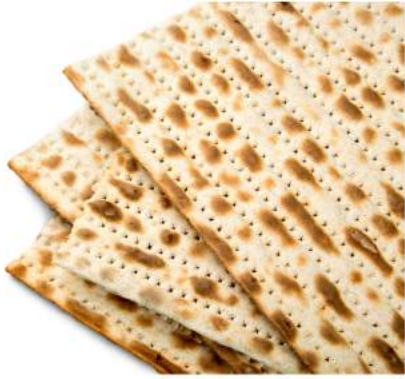

PASSOVER STORY SEQUENCING

INTRODUCTION

This Passover Story Sequence is a wonderful way to engage your child in Jewish learning, as well as practice their memory, concentration, reading, and sequencing skills!

HOW TO USE

Print out the cards and summary sheet. Cut out the cards along the solid line as well as between the image card and the sequence summary card below it (where the scissor icon is).

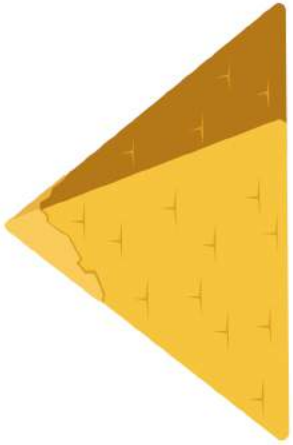
Glue or tape the sequence summaries cards to the back of their respective image card.

If desired, laminate.

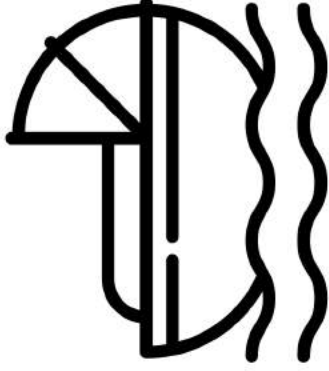
You can also add Velcro stickies if you want to tell the story on a felt board.

To practice the sequencing, you can start with the first card and read the summary, then show the image. Read the remaining cards in order, lining them up as you read them. You can also put all cards in a pile or basket and invite your child to look through the cards to find the first one, and so on, helping them practice telling the story and sequencing themselves.

The story is also provided in this packet after the sequence card pages.



1. A long ago in Egypt the Jews were slaves. They had to work very hard. They did not like being slaves.



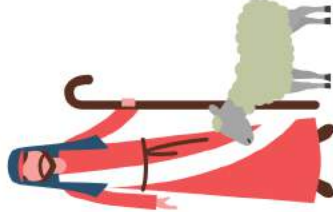
2. The evil Pharaoh ordered all Jewish baby boys to be killed. *You can change this to "be taken away" or another phrase. Moses' mother, Yocheved, hid baby Moses for three months but then sent him in a basket down the river. She wanted him to be safe.



3. Miriam, Moses' big sister, watched over him. Miriam saw Pharaoh's daughter find the baby. Pharaoh's daughter decided to keep Moses and raise him as her own. Miriam offered for Yocheved to nurse Moses.



4. While Moses grew up in the Pharaoh's palace, the Jewish slaves continued to be treated horribly and they cried out to G-d for help.



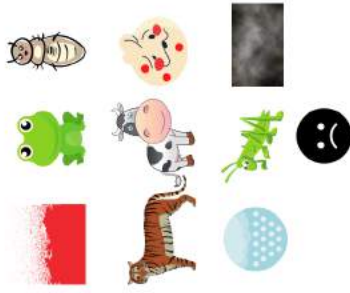
5. One day, Moses saw an Egyptian taskmaster hurting a Jewish slave. Moses got so mad he hurt the Egyptian taskmaster. Moses was scared he would get in trouble and ran away from Egypt. He became a shepherd.



6. Many years later Moses saw a burning bush while he herded sheep. It was on fire but not burning. Moses heard G-d's voice telling him go to Pharaoh and demand that the Jewish people be set free.



7. Moses was scared. He was not a good speaker. G-d told Moses his brother Aaron could help him speak.



8. Moses told Pharaoh to "Let my people go!" Pharaoh said no. G-d sent ten plagues on the Egyptians. After each plague Pharaoh agreed to let the Jews go free, but then he changed his mind. Finally, after the tenth plague, Pharaoh said the Jews can leave.



9. The Jews packed their things and left quickly. They left so fast that the bread they were baking didn't have time to rise.



10. Then Pharaoh changed his mind again and sent his army chasing after the Jews. The Jews came to a great sea but were trapped.



11. But then a miracle happened: The sea parted and the Jewish people walked across.



12. As soon as the Jews reached the other side, the sea closed up and the army was gone. The Jews were free! Miriam, Moses' sister, led them in song and dance and celebration.

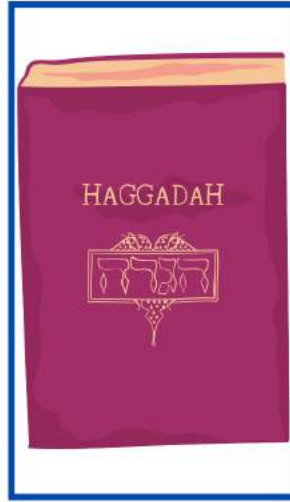
Laminate if desired.
